**Course Description:** This course will cover proofs of theorems involving sequences, limits, continuity, derivatives and integrals

**Prerequisites:** MAT 2404 - Calculus 3

**Learning Outcomes** Preliminary material from sets, functions, sequences and real numbers will be reviewed by the students. Properties of these sets, functions, sequences and real numbers will be proved by the student, then these results will be used by the student to prove basic theorems of limits, derivatives, and integrals.

### Course Policies:

1. Few students in an advanced Mathematics course can do well without everyday attendance. Examples and questions are provided in abundance during each class meeting. After the graded work is returned, it is too late to turn it in and a zero will be given.

## Assignments and Grading

1. Your grade will be based on your average score on homework and exams (including the final exam). Your homework average will count as one exam. I will double the highest of all of these grades to get an average that is 90% of your semester grade.

2. Homework will be randomly collected and graded (from 3 to 8 times through the semester), or else a quiz over the homework assignment will be given the next class meeting. The average of these grades will count as one exam.

2. Class Attendance, tardiness, and participation (10%). This is a subjective grade based on the number of absences, tardies, and amount of verbal class participation throughout the semester. Perfect attendance with no tardies and moderate participation will result in a perfect score.

3. *The grading scale is: A = 90 - 100, B = 80-89, C = 70-79, D = 60-69, F = below 60. A non-integer numerical grade will be rounded to the next higher integer (a 79.50 would be an 80 for a B, a 79.49 would be a 79 for a C). I know this doesn't seem quite always fair, but this comes from our traditional way of recording letter grades. There has to be a dividing point. I will under no circumstances ever "budge" a numeric grade up at one of these dividing points. Whatever you make is exactly what you will get. Example: Suppose your quiz/project/programs/hw grades are 82,80,90,92,91,90 and you make a 95 on the final. Suppose your attendance/participation grade is a 100. Your grade will be  $(82 + 80 + 90 + 92 + 91 + 90 + 95)/8 = 89 \times 90\% + 100 \times 10\% = 90$  for the course (which would be an "A").*

## Instructional and Outside Word Estimate

Face to face time (3 hrs/wk x 15 wks) = 45 hrs

Chapter and Outside Readings (300 pages) = 12 hrs

Exam Preparation (5 exams, 8 hrs study time) = 40 hrs

Assignments (approximately 25 assignments x 2 hours per assignment) = 50 hrs

Miscellaneous Assignments (extra practice problems, tutor meetings, etc. average of 2 hours each for 5 occurrences) = 10 hours
